





"The skills training and education that South Tyneside College provides is important, and it is going to become increasingly important.


"I wish you success in your endeavours in bringing this excellent service into the 21st century.

Staff and students from the College's Marine School proudly handed over £1502 to the Sir Bobby Robson Foundation after organising a competitive charity row from Newcastle Quayside to South Shields back in June.

Teams from South Tyneside College, Fleetwood Nautical School in Blackpool and the North of England P&I Club took to the River Tyne and raced to win the 150th Year Marine School Challenge Cup.

The row had been organised as part of the College's 150th Anniversary celebrations.

Captain John Perry, Lecturer at South Tyneside College was a key member of the organising team, said: "We are delighted to have raised so much money for such a fantastic charity. We initially set ourselves a target of £1000 which we have exceeded thanks to the kindness and generosity of everybody.

"It was a great day and I know everyone involved thoroughly enjoyed themselves. We are already making plans for the race again next year."

## Students celebrate record A Level results

Hundreds of A Level students celebrated record A Level results in August – the College’s highest ever pass rate.

Lindsey Whiterod said: “We are delighted with this year’s A Level results. Our students have done extremely well, achieving a 98% pass rate, an increase of 3% on last year’s results.

“Our students have achieved 172 coveted high grades (A\*, A and B) and many of our subjects are now showing a 100% pass rate for the last four years.

“It is a great reward for the students who have worked so hard to achieve these results and a reflection of the high standards staff set at the College. Thank you to all tutors who have helped our students achieve their full potential.”



## A new look and more investment to follow

**The last year has seen the College invest over £4 million in a range of brand new facilities.** These have included; a new main entrance, reception / student services area, refectory, classrooms, workshops and learning areas, which have sparked new life into the College campus. Significant investment has also taken place in the Halls of Residence – Dr Winterbottom Hall.

The investment will continue over the coming months following the recent announcement of the College's success in securing an Enhanced Renewal Grant (Phase 2) from the Skills Funding Agency (SFA).

The grant, totalling £1 million will contribute to the continued redevelopment of the College, fundamentally remodelling areas of the Westoe campus including a specific Marine School building and individual entrance. A further £2.2 million will be contributed by the College creating a total project value of £3.2 million.

John Watson said: "This is great news for the College and a great start to 2012 when success and achievement is high on everyone's list. The College has proven again it is a very strong competitor on the national and international scene with our second successful capital bid."

Lindsey Whiterod said: "We are all thrilled by the news; it is not only great for the College going forward but also for the organisations we work with. This capital investment means that we can continue to redevelop the College and greatly enhance the student experience."



Louis Waugh, Students' Union President, said: "The new modern environment makes the College feel like an exciting place to learn and the refurbished 1861 Club where the Students' Union hold meetings and events is now a great place to socialise."



Katherine Shutt, Students' Union Vice President, said: "Walking through the new modern open plan reception sets the scene for the way the College has been refurbished into a bright, airy building with vibrant colours and stylish furniture. It's brilliant and can only get better now that even more new facilities are planned."

Marine Engineering Cadet, Nick Rudd won an award for his innovative safety idea at the **Chamber of Shipping's 17th Annual British Shipping Safety Awareness Award ceremony**. Nick received a joint runner up award from Rear Admiral Sir Jeremy de Halpert, Deputy Master of Trinity House who sponsored the event.



Teams competing in the **2011/12 Volvo Ocean Race** returned yet again to the **Marine Safety Training Centre (MSTC)** for offshore safety training as they prepared for the tough professional yacht race. The elite yachtsmen will sail for nine months taking them on a journey of over 39,000 nautical miles through the world's most treacherous seas and chose the College once more for the excellent facilities and realistic training environment.



The College welcomed the first contingent of **Royal Australian Navy personnel**, who travelled across the globe to receive **Marine High Voltage** training.



As part of Fresher Week events students took part in a charity walk which ended at Ocean Beach Pleasure Park where they enjoyed all the fun of the fair. The students raised £960 and donated it to **St Clare's Hospice and the RNLI**.

Six **Business Career Academy** students kick started their careers as they took their first steps onto the career ladder by undertaking 6 week summer internships at leading employers.

## Training for the alternative energy sector

Alternative energy is forecast to become the biggest growth area in domestic energy the UK has ever experienced. To help meet the training demands this industry has created we've developed a series of training courses in partnership with organisations in the industry to equip the workforce with the skills and knowledge required to work safely both onshore and offshore.

These courses utilise our extensive and unique facilities in offshore safety training and include Europe's first offshore platform transfer simulator to recreate realistic working conditions.

A team of engineers from Dale Power Solutions have already completed an intensive four day marine safety training programme, to enable them to work safely when working on offshore wind sites.

Trainees undertook two days of working at height and rescue training on Narec's twenty-seven metre high training tower in Blyth and spent a further two days at our Marine Safety Training Centre.

Graham Johnson, Head of School – Marine Safety Training Centre said: "The partnership with Narec is a perfect fit; between us we are able to offer a complete solution to meet the turbine safety training requirements of the offshore wind industry."

Kevin Thompson, Service Operations Manager at Dale Power Solutions, said: "The training facilities and bespoke training package available as a result of the partnership between Narec and South Tyneside College has enabled us to provide the quality training we need to equip our engineers for working safely in the offshore renewables environment."



## Making a difference

We take our social responsibilities very seriously and see this as an essential part of our business.   - a free shuttle bus operates between various locations across South Tyneside
  - we keenly support the government's Cycle to Work scheme

### Waste

- We are developing a Waste Management Strategy, adopting the concept of the Waste Hierarchy
- We have invested in time limited showers and percussion taps to reduce water wastage across our Halls of Residence. Longer term we plan to look into the feasibility of rain harvesting

### Health & Wellbeing

We seek to continuously improve all aspects of the working environment, including:

- Use of Occupational Health Services
- Health and lifestyle programme (for staff and students)
- Chilled drinking water across the sites
- Regular visits and advice to students from the District Nurse

- Provision of facility for Primary Healthcare Trust to interface with our learners
- Revised menus with our new 'EAT' refectory to encompass healthier options

### Equality & Diversity

We actively celebrate cultural diversity. To support this we are in partnership with the charitable organisation Compact for Racial Equality in South Tyneside (CREST) who are now located on the Westoe Campus. A Multi-faith chaplaincy is available on site to provide for the spiritual wellbeing of our staff, learners and the community. The College also provides the borough with the facility for the celebration of Diwali. To celebrate the cultural diversity of the borough and the student population we hold an annual Equality and Diversity day.

### Communities

We are proud of our fundraising achievements. Each year we nominate a charity to support. In the past we have given funds to Cancer Connections and the Sir Bobby Robson Foundation. There is also an annual charity walk that takes place during induction week. In addition to this, many of our staff and students raise funds for charities close to their own hearts - over the past year we've had comic relief, children in need, breast cancer to name but a few.

Members of the local community are actively encouraged to participate in some of the benefits the we can provide. For example we have a Lifestyle Centre which provides fitness facilities to the community. The Bistro 150 restaurant also provides high quality food and our Hairdressing and Beauty Therapy facilities are open to the wider community.

We also support the local community in many other ways. For example, we host annual RNLI charity sales and our car parks are utilised for the Great North Run.





Total students by age




### A significant local employer






